JIM FOSTER TO RETIRE

Dear People of Peace;

This is a letter I have anticipated writing for the last two or three years, and for some of you it will not come as a surprise. For a variety of reasons, the time has come for me to retire from my roles as director of *Peacebuilding Institute of East Tennessee* and as president of the larger networking organization, the *Peacebuilding Institute*. It has been a long and satisfying dozen years.

Two things in particular have converged to make this a particularly appropriate moment to step down:

- (1) The loss our 501-c-3 status on June 13, 2011, necessitated a major reorganization of the organization as a taxable voluntary association. That reorganization has been completed, and most of our services and programs continue as before. The only major casualty of the new order has been the Mustard Seed Project which is not viable as a taxable entity.
- (2) For the past three years, I have been searching for my replacement, a person with a passion for peace, preferably young and energetic, and with the computer, writing, and other communication skills required for effective peace activism. It also had to be someone who could work for the same salarynothing. That someone has recently surfaced in the person of Carrie Mayes San Angelo. Her biography follows this letter. Carrie is a bundle of energy, and is already forming a vision of what she hopes will be a vibrant and effective association of peacebuilders both locally and worldwide. I urge all of you who have participated with me, in whatever way, in our peacebuilding endeavors to redouble your commitment to peace and to join with Carrie in the work going forward.
- I, personally, will continue as a resource person for Carrie. My focus in my retirement will be writing for and editing the online journal *En Christo: A Journal for a New Christianity*, the latest issue of which should be online by early March 2012. HUMAN RIGHTS ALERTS

Organizations around the world work tirelessly to insure basic rights for all people. As abuses continue in Nepal, Syria, Somalia, and too many other countries to name, peacebuilders have opportunities to choose campaigns and focus their efforts. Web sites that provide information include the following. This list is not exhaustive.

The Asian Human Rights Commission (AHRC) was founded in 1986 by a prominent group of jurists and human rights activists in Asia. It is an independent, non-governmental body, which seeks to promote greater awareness and realization of human rights in Asia, and to mobilize public opinion to obtain relief and redress for the victims of human rights violations. AHRC promotes civil and political rights, as well as economic, social and cultural rights.

The African Commission on Human and Peoples' Rights was established by the African Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights, which came into force on 21 October 1986. It is charged with ensuring the promotion and protection of Human and Peoples' Rights throughout the African Continent. For almost two decades after the creation of the Organisation of African Unity (OAU) in May 1963, its focused on decolonization eradication of apartheid. In spite of the Organisation's endorsement of the principles of the Universal Declaration on Human Rights of 1948 in the preamble of the OAU Charter, the promotion and protection of human rights within member states was not a priority. Rather, it concentrated on political and economic independence, non-discrimination and the liberation of Africa the continent and apartheid

in Southern Africa, at the expense of individual liberty.

The European Human Rights System consists of many organizations founded to bring peace and stability to Europe following the devastation of World War II. Each was established with a different purpose.

- The <u>Council of Europe</u> promotes the rule of law, human rights, and democracy.
- The <u>European Union</u> was devised as an institution for promoting trade and economic stability for its members.
- The <u>Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe</u>(OSCE) was founded to maintain peace and military security within Europe.

Today, these organizations have evolved to address many overlapping issues, all dealing to some extent with human rights, though the Council of Europe remains the most involved.

The <u>Australian Human Rights Commission</u> is the new name of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission. The Commission was established in 1986 by an act of the federal Parliament. It is an independent statutory organization and reports to the federal Parliament through the Attorney-General.

The Inter-American Commission on human Rights is a principal and autonomous organ of the Organization of American States (OAS) whose mission is to promote and protect human rights in the American hemisphere. It is composed of seven independent members who serve in a personal capacity. Created by the OAS in 1959, the Commission has its headquarters in Washington, D.C. Together with the Inter-American Court of Human Rights ("the Court" or "the I/A Court H.R.), installed in 1979, the Commission is one of the institutions within the

inter-American system for the protection of human sights ("IAHRS").

Occupy Wall Street protesters held their biggest march so far this year today as part of a nationwide "Shut Down the Corporations" day of action.

Several hundred occupiers gathered in Bryant Park this morning before marching east on 42nd Street to the global headquarters of Pfizer Pharmaceuticals, targeted because the company is a member of the American Legislative Exchange Council.

When the marchers returned to Bryant Park, Rolling Stone writer <u>Matt Taibbi</u> delivered a lecture explaining the origins of the mortgage crisis and the role played by Bank of America.

It is possible that the U.S. will engage in another attack on vet another country to make sure it gets its oil. (Truthout, 2/15/12) Already there have been attacks by the U.S. and Israel. There have been explosions at military and nuclear facilities in Iran, and five Iranian nuclear scientists have been assassinated since 2007. Of course, the reason for the attack will not be given as a desire for oil. As always, we will be told that the attacks were to protect American safety and freedom. However, there are a few facts that should be known about Iran to dispute this rationale. Iran, unlike the U.S. and Israel, does not have a nuclear weapon. Iran has the right, according to international law, to develop nuclear energy for civilian use. The U.S. military budget for 2012 is almost equal to Iran's entire Gross National Product. Iran, unlike Israel, has signed the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. Iran, unlike the U.S., has never invaded another nation. The C.I.A. overthrew the democratically elected government of Iran, led by Dr. Mohammad Mosaddegh, in 1953 and replaced him with the brutal Shah Palavi Rezi who denationalized Iranian oil and returned it to the ownership of British and U.S. companies. The Shah executed and tortured thousands of Iranians during his twenty-six year reign, that ended in 1979 when the people revolted. The new economic sanctions on Iran include a ban on the import, sale and trade of Iranian oil, which constitutes half of Iran's Gross National Product. This is meant to make the people of Iran suffer so much that they will revolt against their President and remove him from office. These sanctions constitute a blockade or an act of war against Iran, even though Iran poses no threat to the people of the U.S. or Europe.
